It's a smart, fair way to ensure everyone gets a good fit. However, one must note that the experience level of delegates is also considered while allocating committees, to ensure each individual can participate in a fruitful and engaging debate.

Tips for Making Your Choices

Being strategic about your committee selections can greatly improve your chances of a positive outcome. Some committees are historically more popular or competitive than others. While you should absolutely list a highly competitive committee as your top choice if you're passionate about it, it's wise to include a less-competitive but still appealing option as your second or third preference. Remember to research all the committees and their topics to make informed decisions that reflect your genuine interests and goals for the conference.
